COVID-19 Update #10 – Return to On-Site Learning from the Principal for Parents and Caregivers

Dear Parents & Caregivers,

I am writing to further update you on the changing situation in response to coronavirus COVID-19. Please be advised that Victoria Point State High School has had zero reported cases to date.

Following updated advice from health authorities and as announced by the Queensland Government, students in Years 11 and 12 will return to on-site learning from Monday 11 May 2020. They will join children of essential workers and vulnerable children. All other students in Years 7 to 10 will continue with learning at home arrangements at this time. Where a student is learning at home, the parent or carer is responsible for the student's safety at home or elsewhere. If low transmission rates continue, students in Years 7–10 will return to school from Monday 25 May 2020. Confirmation of this further step will be made by Friday 15 May 2020.

It is recognised that some parents or carers may choose to keep a student in Year 11 or 12 at home. It is the responsibility of the Parent/Caregiver to notify the school of a student's learning intentions and/or absence: Telephone: 3820 5878 SMS: 0400161 690

The classroom teacher is not responsible for providing an alternative home-based learning program for students in Years 11 and 12 where a parent/carer elects to keep children at home. Parents/Caregivers of students who are not present at school and who have not contacted the school will receive a text message as per the school's Attendance Policy process.

On-Site Learning Years 11 and 12

Students in Years 11 and 12 will resume timetabled classes from Monday 11 May 2020. Students are expected to be on time, bring the required equipment (including their digital device if available), be in full school uniform and engage in learning in a respectful manner.

Victoria Point State High School will ensure access to Tutorials and the school's Homework Centre is available from this date.

On-Site Learning Years 7 to 10

Children of essential workers and vulnerable children attending on-site will maintain continuity of learning and teaching through Victoria Point State High School's Online Learning Platform – Moodle under supervision. Please be assured, all teaching and learning contributes to your child's educational outcomes and students will not be disadvantaged through the current circumstances.

On-Site Health and Safety Measures

Victoria Point State High School will continue to ensure all appropriate precautions regarding health and hygiene as advised by Queensland Health. This includes:

- Increased cleaning services and maintenance of student facilities
- School signage acknowledging good hygiene practices and social distancing
- Adjustments to classroom organisation to allow for individual student desk placements within the available space
- 2m chevrons for students to abide by when purchasing food from the canteen and access to hand sanitiser prior to purchase.
